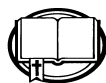

Message from Pastor Lesemann

The Lord's Prayer

“Very early in the morning, while it was still dark, Jesus got up, left the house and went off to a solitary place, where he prayed.” (Mark 1:35) How about you? Did you begin your day with prayer? Martin Luther once commented, “As it is the business of tailors to make clothes, so it is the business of Christians to pray...” and Jesus is our best example!

The disciples were not blind to His example. As it states in Luke 11:1, *“Now Jesus was praying in a certain place, and when he finished, one of his disciples said to him, “Lord, teach us to pray...”* In response to the disciple's request He taught them how and for what to pray.

We have two accounts of what He taught them and interestingly the Lord's Prayer appears in two forms, the shorter version in Luke 11:2–4 and the longer version, part of the Sermon on the Mount, in Matthew 6:9–13. Either way, for the countless generations that have followed these, they have served as a guide for the proper model of prayer.

The Lord's Prayer is comprised of seven petitions, which are divided up very much like the Ten Commandments. The first three petitions deal with our relationship toward God—vertical—and the last four petitions deal with the horizontal relationships we have with others. Likewise, the first great commandment is to love the Lord, and the second great commandment is to love your neighbor. And logically God should come first in our prayers; His counsel and will should be the great priority in our lives. But we must also not neglect our relationships on earth, which is why Jesus' model includes those around us.

Now even though Jesus taught this prayer, most Christian theologians do point out that Jesus would have never used this prayer to apply to himself, for it specifically asks for forgiveness of sins or, more literally, for cancellation of debts, and as we know, Christ never sinned. However since it says "forgive us our sins", not "forgive me my sins", Christ might have prayed it by way of identifying himself with the common plight of man and of asking for the forgiveness of the sins of his disciples.

“My Father is with Me”

“I’m lonely.” Have you ever heard those words? Sometimes, people are afraid to admit it. Other times, we can understand why someone is lonely. Their spouse had died. Their kids are grown and moved away (or maybe they never had any kids). Their friends and neighbors have moved from the area. They moved to a nursing home and are no longer able to get out and socialize like they had. In some cases, a person may be surrounded by family, friends, and coworkers yet still be lonely.

The Merriam-Webster dictionary defines lonely as “being without company” or “cut off from others.” How many times during the Passion story does that definition fit Jesus? The three disciples He took with Him in the Garden while He prayed fell asleep (Matt 26:36-46); Judas, His friend and disciple, betrayed Him (Matt 26:47-50); all of the disciples fled during His arrest in the Garden (Matt 26:56b); Peter, another disciple and close friend, denied knowing Him three times (John 18:15-18 and 25-27); no one was mentioned as being with

Him when He was on trial before Annas, Caiphas, and Pilate (John 18:12-14, 19-24, and 28 – 19:16); on the cross, He was mocked by the crowds (Luke 23:35-39); only one disciple and a few women witnessed His crucifixion (John 19:25-27); in His death, only Joseph and Nicodemus cared enough to bury Him (John 19:38-42).

How lonely and forsaken Jesus must have felt! Our Good Friday service at St. John for 2013, put it this way, “Is there a greater pain or wound in life than to have those whom you love turn on you, your friends betray you and disown you?”

Imagine your closest friends, your spouse, your business partner, your brother or sister betraying you, leaving you, forsaking you. It’s hard to imagine. Yet, it happened to Jesus – His closest friends all left Him.

Though you may feel lonely, sad, and sorrowful if something like that ever happens to you, Jesus words put it into perspective and offer us hope. Talking to His disciples, He said, “But a time is coming, and has already come, when you will be scattered, each to his own home. You will leave Me all alone. Yet, I am not alone, for My Father is with Me” (John 16:32). Often, we look around and we do not see anyone beside us, anyone there with us, so we get the idea that we are alone, abandoned by everyone. That reminds me of the poem, “Footprints in the Sand.”

One night a man had a dream. He dreamed he was walking along the beach with the Lord. Across the sky flashed scenes from his life. For each scene, he noticed two sets of footprints in the sand; one belonged to him, and the other to the Lord.

When the last scene of his life flashed before him, he looked back at the footprints in the sand. He noticed that many times along the path of his life there was only one set of footprints. He also noticed that it happened at the very lowest and saddest times in his life.

This really bothered him and he questioned the Lord about it. "Lord, you said that once I decided to follow you, you'd walk with me all the way. But I have noticed that during the most troublesome times in my life, there is only one set of footprints. I don't understand why when I needed you most you would leave me."

The Lord replied, "My precious, precious child, I love you and would never leave you. During your times of trial and suffering, when you see only one set of footprints, it was then that I carried you."

As the poem shows us, we are never alone. There is always Someone with us – our Heavenly Father. Just as He remained with Jesus during His betrayal, trial, and crucifixion, He has promised to remain with us, “I will never leave you nor forsake you” (Hebrews 13:5).



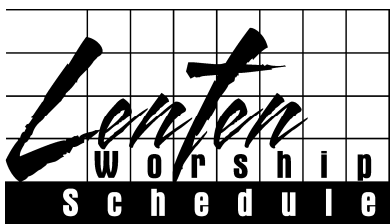

M i s s i o n s p o t l i g h t

This month's Mission Spotlight will focus on a missionary right here in Storm Lake: you! Have you ever seen how Gary Thies at Mission Central addresses the letters to us? He calls us "The Honorable Missionaries at St. John Lutheran Church." Have you ever thought of yourself as a missionary? Probably not. Most people think of a missionary as someone who puts all their belongings in storage and heads off to a foreign country for a number of years to tell others about Jesus. That is certainly the most obvious form of a missionary, but is there more to being a missionary than that? There must be, if you consider the way Gary addresses us. Why would Gary call us missionaries? There are a number of reasons.

The most obvious way to be a missionary without ever leaving your home is to pray. It is through prayer and our requests that people who are hearing the Word become receptive to it. We can follow those prayers with specific petitions for protection, safety, guidance, and wisdom for the missionaries and their families who are currently serving in foreign countries.

The second way is by financially supporting those who are abroad. That is the whole idea behind Gary Thies and his work at Mission Central. The missionaries who have been sent overseas rely on financial support from people back in the US so that they can remain where they are and do their work.

The next way is by attending the presentations of current missionaries at Mission Central or at St. John when they come back on furlough. It is a good way to keep in touch with them and the specific work they do. Plus, through their pictures, you are able to take a "mini vacation" to the land they are serving without the hassle of actually traveling there ☺

The final way is something you are already doing, but you can carry it a step farther. Many of you have already brought in plastic shopping bags that will be used to create mats for people in foreign countries, but you can proceed to the next step and learn how to crochet these bags into mats. There are several women in the congregation who are already making these mats. I've spoken to some of them and received directions for the different stages that the project involves. For those of you who would like to try making a mat on your own, just follow the steps below. If you get stuck or need further help, I'm sure any of these ladies would be happy to assist you, give you personal lessons, or show you step by step how to make the mats, just call the office and I can contact one of them for you.

First, unwrinkle the bag and fold it three times with the bottom at one end and the handles on the other. Cut off and discard the bottom section and the handles.

Then, cut the remaining part of the bag into 2" strips.

Next, unfold the strips and loop/string them together. Make sure to pull them together tightly to make a good knot. After you have a bunch looped together, you can roll them into a ball to make "plarn" (plastic yarn).

The next step is to use a basic single crochet and begin turning the "plarn" into a mat. Adult mats measure 3 feet wide by 6 feet long.

A bit of trivia: the ladies estimated it takes 400-500 shopping bags to create one mat. That's a lot of trips to Walmart!

The ladies who have been making these tell me it's a relaxing project that they like to do while they are watching TV, which makes the time pass quickly and soon they are done. There must be several relaxed ladies at St. John because we have sent 14 mats overseas with Orphan Grain Train since we began this project! It's not too late for you to start your own relaxing project!

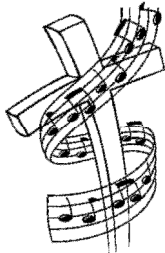
